	MYP / Interdisciplinary Learning	<p>Interdisciplinary learning is the process by which students come to understand bodies of knowledge and modes of thinking from two or more disciplines and then integrate them to create a new understanding. Students demonstrate this by bringing together concepts, methods or forms of communication to explain a phenomenon, solve a problem, create a product or raise a new question in ways that would have been unlikely through a single discipline.</p>	<p>Aim: Students will inquire into compelling issues, ideas and challenges by creating products or explaining phenomena</p> <p>Related global contexts:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. 	IBCP Core / Community and Service	<p>Students work with community members to undertake service activities that satisfy identified community needs. The concept of community may be viewed from a local or global perspective. The component is based on the principle of service learning, whereby service is a vehicle for new learning of academic value.</p> <p>The emphasis is on developing local knowledge, civic responsibility, social aptitude and personal growth. 	IBDP / Philosophy	<p>The course develops highly transferable skills such as the ability to formulate arguments clearly, to make reasoned judgments and to evaluate highly complex and multifaceted issues. It is focused on stimulating students' intellectual curiosity and encouraging them to examine both their own perspectives and those of others. 	IBDP / Social and Cultural Anthropology	<p>Social and cultural anthropology is the comparative study of culture and human societies and the exploration of the general principles of social and cultural life. The course places emphasis on comparative perspectives that make cultural assumptions explicit, and contributes to an understanding of contemporary real-world issues such as war and conflict, the environment, poverty, injustice, and human rights.</p> <p>Areas of anthropological inquiry in this course are: belonging; classifying the world; communication, expression and technology; conflict; development; health, illness and healing; movement, time and space; production, exchange and consumption; and the body. 	IBDP CORE / TOK	<p>Theory of knowledge (TOK) is a course about critical thinking and inquiring into the process of knowing, rather than about learning a specific body of knowledge.
